MPUMALANGA SECOND ADJUSTMENTS APPROPRIATION BILL, 2023

(As introduced in the Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature (as a section 120 Bill))

(MEC FOR FINANCE, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND TOURISM)

BILL

To effect adjustments to the appropriation of money from the Provincial Revenue Fund for the requirements of the Province in respect of the 2022/23 financial year; and to provide for matters incidental thereto.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS section 226(2)(a) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, provides that money may be withdrawn from the Provincial Revenue Fund only in terms of an appropriation by a Provincial Act or as a direct charge against that Fund, when it is provided for in the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, or an Act of the Provincial Legislature;

WHEREAS the Mpumalanga Appropriation Act, 2022 (Act No. 2 of 2022), provides for the appropriation of money from the Provincial Revenue Fund to provide for the requirements of the Province in respect of the 2022/23 financial year;

WHEREAS the Mpumalanga Adjustments Appropriation Act, 2022 (Act No.3 of 2022) effected adjustments to the appropriation of money provided for in the Appropriation Act, 2022, and whereas further adjustments are required;

AND WHEREAS section 31 of the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999), provides for the tabling of provincial adjustments budget and an adjustments Appropriation Bill to make adjustments to the appropriations in an Appropriation Act,

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature, as follows:-

Interpretation

1. In this Act, unless the context indicates otherwise, any word or expression to which a meaning has been assigned in section 1 of the Mpumalanga Appropriation Act, 2022 (Act No. 2 of 2022), or section 1 of the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999), must bear the meaning so assigned.

Adjustments to appropriations of money for requirements of the Province

- 2. (1) Adjustments to appropriations by the Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature of money from the Provincial Revenue Fund for the requirements of the Province in the 2022/23 financial year to votes and the main divisions within a vote, and amendments to the purposes that are specified, are set out in the Schedule to this Act.
- (2) The spending of appropriations envisaged in subsection (1) is subject to this Act, the Mpumalanga Appropriation Act, 2022, the Mpumalanga Adjustments Appropriation Act, 2022, the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 and the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022).

Short title

3. This Act is called the Mpumalanga Second Adjustments Appropriation Act, 2023.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM ON THE OBJECTS OF THE MPUMALANGA SECOND ADJUSTMENTS APPROPRIATION BILL, 2023

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1. Section 31(1) of the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 (Act No.1 of 1999) (PFMA) provides to the effect that "the MEC for Finance in a Province may table an adjustments budget in the Provincial Legislature subject to subsection (3)". Furthermore, section 31(2)(a)-(e) makes provision for instances upon which adjustments may be made. This adjustment is in terms of section 31(2)(a) and (e) of the PFMA respectively to the effect that "an adjustments budget of a province may only provide for- (a) the appropriation of funds that have become available in the province"; and "(e) the shifting of funds between and within votes...."
- 1.2. Based on the above, the Mpumalanga Second Adjustments Appropriation Bill, 2023 ("the Bill") provides for the appropriation of funds for the Mpumalanga Provincial Government arising from the transfer and the reduction of conditional grants to provinces published by the Minister of Finance, Mr E Godongwana, through the following Government Gazettes issued in terms of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022) as amended:-
- 1.2.1. Government Gazette No. 47789 dated 23 December 2022, which notice affects the National Health Insurance Grant;
- 1.2.2. Government Gazette No. 47882 dated 19 January 2023, which notice affects the Human Settlement Grant (HSDG) and the Informal Settlements Upgrading Partnership Grant: Provinces (ISUPG); and Government Gazette no. 48095 dated 21 February 2023; and
- 1.2.3. Government Gazette No. 48095 dated 21 February 2023, which notice affects the Education Infrastructure Grant (EIG) and the Provincial Emergency Grant.
- 1.3. Departments will also have an opportunity to do virements where necessary.

Conditional Grants

- 1.4. For Government Gazette No. 48095 dated 21 February 2023, and in compliance with section 18 of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022), as amended, the National Department of Basic Education has stopped the transfer of funds amount of R311.949 million to the province. The Bill therefore provides for second adjustments to the Province's budget in order to reduce funding appropriated from the National Department of Basic Education. In this regard, the budget baseline of the Department of Education will therefore be accordingly decreased by R311.949 million, in order to stop funding towards Education Infrastructure Grant.
- 1.5. For Government Gazette No. 47789 dated 23 December 2022, and in compliance with section 19 of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022), as amended, the National Department of Health has in 2022 stopped the transfer of funds to the affected Provinces and R13.447 million thereof is re-allocated to the Province. The Bill therefore provides for second adjustments to the Province's budget in order to receive and appropriate the additional funding. In this regard, the budget baseline of the Department of Health will therefore be accordingly increased by R13.447 million, in order to direct funding towards National Health Insurance Grant.
- 1.6. For Government Gazette No. 47882 dated 19 January 2023, and in compliance with section 19 of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022), as amended, the National Department of Human Settlements has in stopped the transfer of funds to the affected Provinces, and a total amount of R300 million is re-allocated to the province. The Bill therefore provides for second adjustments to the Province's budget in order to receive and appropriate the additional funding. In this regard, the budget baseline of the Department of Human Settlements will therefore be accordingly increased by R300 million, of which R100 million thereof will be directed towards Human Settlements Development Grant and R200 million, towards Informal Settlements Upgrading Partnership Grant.

Provincial Revenue Fund

- 1.7 An amount of **R525.630 million** is available from the Provincial Revenue Fund which was declared unspent, and the baseline of the affected Departments will be reduced as accordingly detailed in the Schedule to the Bill.
- 1.8. From the declared unspent funds, the Department of Education will receive **R15 million** to be transferred to the Mpumalanga Regional Training Trust.

2. SUMMARY OF BILL

The following is a brief summary of the Bill:

Clause 1 provides for the Interpretation of the Bill;

Clause 2 provides for the second adjustments to appropriations of money for the requirements of the Province in respect of the 2022/23 financial year to certain votes and main divisions within a vote; and

Clause 3 contains the short title.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS FOR THE PROVINCE

- 4.1. The budget baseline of the Department of Health will be increased by **R13.447 million**, in order to direct funding towards National Health Insurance Grant.
- 4.2. The budget baseline of the Department of Human Settlements will be increased by a total of **R300 million**, of which **R100 million** is directed towards the Human Settlements Development Grant and **R200 million** towards Informal the Settlements Upgrading Partnership Grant.
- 4.3. The budget baseline of the Department of Education will be decreased by **R311.949 million**, and same will therefore reduce funding towards Education Infractructure Grant.
- 4.4. An amount of **R15 million** will be added to the Department of Education from the Provincial Revenue Fund to be transferred to the Mpumalanga Regional Training Trust.
- 4.5. The Bill will also adjust the budget baselines of the above-mentioned votes by a combined total amount of **R509.132** million.

5. CONSTITUTIONAL IMPLICATIONS

The recommendations that are made in the Bill take into account the provisions of sections 119, 120 and 226 of the Constitution.

6. LEGISLATIVE PROCEDURE

The Bill is a money Bill which must be dealt with in accordance with the procedure prescribed by section 120 read with section 119 of the Constitution.
