

Mpumalanga Budget Summary 2020

Let's Grow Mpumalanga Together









The 2020 Mpumalanga Provincial Budget indicates how much revenue the Provincial Government expects to get and specifies the spending choices for the year commencing 1 April 2020.

The approach of the Provincial Government is to use the budget as an instrument of change to improve the socio-economic profile of the communities in the Province.

The Provincial Budget for 2020/21 gives effect to the priority programmes of the sixth administration, and consider the emerging risks to the fiscal while ensuring social protection to the majority of the people.

The aggregate budget for the 2020 Medium Term Expenditure Framework is **R54,018,839** in 2020/21; **R56,411,672** in 2021/22, and **R59,222,619** in 2022/23 financial year.

The Provincial Treasury has in terms of Section 213 (1) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa established Provincial Revenue Fund. The account is the provincial government depository for money received from the national fiscus and collections in the form of taxes and rates by Provincial departments and public entities.




